About the BCCA

The mission of the BCCA is to advance the co-operative sector by promoting the co-op model, supporting the growth of new co-ops, strengthening existing co-ops and connecting the ecosystem through knowledge sharing and collaboration.

The BC Co-operative Association (BCCA) is a member-owned co-operative, representing the collective interests of co-operatives and credit unions across the province. Our membership is diverse, with nearly 100 members from throughout British Columbia working in range of sectors - from retail goods and services to financial services, community services, alternative energy, and transportation. Through our work, the BCCA advances the vision of a strong and resilient co-operative economy in BC. We do this by:

- 1. **Promoting** and enhancing awareness of the co-operative model amongst elected officials, government staff, entrepreneurs, new-comers, academics, and the general public.
 - BCCA provides an avenue for our members to amplify their voices and raise their concerns with the provincial government through the BCCA's government relations and advocacy activities. We actively listen to our membership and rely on the concerns raised by them to build out our advocacy platform.
 - BCCA personally connects with newcomers in Canada and the Co-operative ecosystem to educate them about the benefits, opportunities, and co-operative difference within co-ops through projects, such as In Our Hands, across BC.
- 2. **Strengthening** cooperatives through the sharing of best practices and development of programs and resources.
 - BCCA is a trusted resource that can provide people interested in starting co-ops with the information and referrals they need for successful start-up. One of our co-op development tools is our free and in-depth Cultivating Coops Guide which has supported over 520 prospective co-operators.
 - BCCA offers shared resources and best practices when tackling co-op specific opportunities and challenges such as governance, member engagement, and employee orientation.
- 3. **Growing** more cooperative businesses, by supporting the innovation of new models and providing tools and referral services for coop startups.
 - BCCA supports the growth of new co-operatives in rural and urban communities across BC, creating employment and opportunities. For ex example, our Co-operate Now business bootcamp has had over 120 entrepreneurs complete the program, many of whom have created co-ops across the province in Nelson, Prince George, Nanaimo, Surrey, Gulf Islands, Victoria, Bowen Island, Squamish, Vancouver, and more



- **Connecting** the ecosystem, by bringing coops together to create strong partnerships and collaboration to amplify our shared values, market visibility, and sector strength.
 - BCCA keeps members connected to other co-ops and credit unions through the sharing of information, opportunities, and updates via our bi-monthly newsletter, social media network, and events.
 - BCCA highlights, shares, and celebrates member successes and stories with other co-operators and the broader public through our communications channels.

The BCCA works alongside the Upper Columbia Co-op Council (UCCC), which was formed in partnership with the BCCA to strengthen and raise awareness of the vibrant co-op sector in the Kootenay and Boundary regions of Southeastern BC. BCCA also continues to work with other provincial and national co-operative associations.

As one of nine provincial co-operative associations across Canada, the BCCA is a member of Co-operatives and Mutuals Canada (CMC). Through its affiliation with CMC, BCCA works to build Canada's co-operative sector. The BCCA is also part of a global co-op movement led by the International Co-operative Alliance (ICA) outside Canada and led nationally by CMC. Through these alliances, we gain support to accelerate and strengthen our local co-op movement, build partnerships with other social impact organizations, and contribute to the transition to a social economy in BC.

Requirements, Responsibilities and Information for Directors

Authority & Responsibility

The Board of Directors is the legal authority for the British Columbia Co-operative Association. As a member of the Board, Directors have a fiduciary responsibility to the organization and are accountable to its members. The Directors set strategic direction and are responsible for ensuring best governance practices and oversight for the management and programs of BCCA.

Qualifications

Directors must have a background in co-operatives or credit unions, preferably at the senior management or board level. In addition, knowledge or experience in the following areas is preferred: marketing and communications, finance, business acumen, policy development, legal, change management, human resources and board governance. The director must have a legal connection (e.g., member, director, employee) with an existing member of BCCA.

Term

Directors are elected at the Annual General Meeting for a two-year term. Terms are staggered such that the Board will always have some continuing Directors.



Tasks and Duties:

Directors must agree to

- Attend quarterly bi-monthly monthly hybrid/virtual Board meetings either in-person, or via zoom.
- Serve on one or more Committees of the BCCA Board.
- Prepare for and participate in the discussions and deliberations of the Board.
- Attend members' meetings and the Annual General Meeting.
- Work with the Board to establish short & long-term goals, objectives and priorities through strategic planning.
- Monitor the effectiveness of BCCA through regular review of programs and services.
- Carry out annual performance reviews of the Executive Director and take appropriate action.
- Promote the services and programs of BCCA through events and community and sector networking.

Governance Principles

Directors must agree to

- Govern BCCA in accordance with policy and rules established by its members.
- Uphold the Mission, Vision & Values of BCCA.
- Be aware of and disclose any conflicts of interest.
- Recommend policy/rules revisions to the membership.
- Act honestly, in good faith and in the best interests of BCCA.
- Treat in confidence all matters and information involving BCCA, its board of directors, its committees, its employees and its members.
- Exercise the care, diligence and skill of a reasonably prudent person under comparable circumstances.
