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CO-OPERATIVES IN B.C.

A co-operative, or co-op, is a business owned by and democratically controlled by its members. Co-ops are inclusive and accountable because all members have a say in how the co-op operates.



The Co-op model provides stable work, keeps money local, and reinvests surplus to help build stronger, more sustainable communities.



Co-ops operate in almost every sector of the B.C. economy, including finance, transportation, housing, renewable energy, agriculture and food, and social services.




B.C. CREDIT UNIONS AT A GLANCE:



The Co-op model has a proven track record of creating jobs, serving the interests of middle-income people, supporting social innovation, all while meeting the needs of Canadian communities. Co-ops have a lower failure rate than incorporated businesses.

B.C. CO-OPS AT A GLANCE

Co-ops in BC operate across a variety of sectors, providing an increasing number of jobs across the province.

STOCKSY



Based in Victoria, B.C., Stocksy is an artist-owned, multi-stakeholder 'digital cooperative' that provides high-end, hand-picked stock photography and video imagery. Contributing artists receive 50% of a Standard License Purchase and 75% of an Extended License Purchase, another differentiator of Stocksy from other stock photo business models.

The co-op employs 25 people in five countries, has over 900 voting member photographers and boasts some of the world's most prestigious ad agencies amongst its clients.

In 2015, Stocksy earned \$7.9 million in sales (with 4.3 million in royalties to artists) and paid \$200,000 in dividends to member artists.



SSG is a workers co-operative based in Vancouver, BC. Since 2001, SSG has worked with local governments, institutions, design teams and artists to achieve real, on-the-ground social and ecological change.

SSG nurtures and embodies a holistic understanding of sustainability and works with clients and collaborators to meaningfully integrate social, ecological and economic practices in their organizations and work. Their transdisciplinary team provides consulting and management services to address sustainability challenges including climate change, economic and social inequities, human health, ecosystem decline, and sustainable community development.

KOOTENAY & BOUNDARY FOOD PRODUCERS CO-OP



Established in 2013, the Kootenay & Boundary Food Producer Co-op supports farmers and food processors in the Kootenay region to build a sustainable, local food economy.

The co-op ran a successful distribution and marketing pilot program in 2015, has been awarded a \$10,000 grant and completed a feasibility study to help achieve its longterm vision for creating and supporting infrastructure, distribution, business and marketing services, and workshops that will foster the economic viability of food producers and processors from Creston to Grand Forks, north to Meadow Creek and Nakusp and south to the border.
